The Sunday Message from Fr Antonio on the Second Sunday of Easter

The secondary school that I attended in south-east London was named after St Thomas the Apostle and I remember being quite disappointed. I wondered why St Thomas was chosen when there were so many other apostles to choose from: bigger, greater and better known apostles, in my opinion. There was St Peter who became our first pope, St John and St Matthew who wrote one of the Gospels each, and even Philip and James would have been cooler choices. And if we couldn't have any of these apostles, why not St Anthony (my favourite saint) or St Francis? The only thing St Thomas seems to be famous for is doubting that Jesus rose from the dead and surely he should be shamed rather than be rewarded by naming a school after him? It wasn't until I had left school, when I was older and wiser, that I began to understand why.

As I've mentioned already, St Thomas is best known for not believing that Jesus had risen without proof. This has earned him the title of "doubting Thomas" which we use even today to describe someone who is reluctant to believe something. St Thomas will forever be labelled "the doubter" for having the audacity to question Jesus' Resurrection. But shouldn't we all be called Doubting Thomas? Like St Thomas, haven't we all doubted our religion at some point? Haven't we all questioned the benevolence or even the existence of God? If only we have physical proof. But we don't.

St Thomas eventually got the proof he needed by seeing the resurrected Christ with his own eyes. But what about the rest of us who'll never have that concrete proof during our lifetime? This is when having a strong foundation of faith is crucial. The answer to all our doubt is faith. Faith is a gift from God and is something we should pray to Him to grant to us each day.

St Thomas, soon after the Resurrection, ventured out to preach the Gospel in faraway countries including India. It's in India where he made the most profound impact and converted many to Christianity. Like the other apostles, Thomas endured much suffering and persecution for his faith. He is a great role model for us. Yes, often we doubt. But it doesn't make us bad, just human. It is okay to have doubts, to ask questions, to be not sure about something. What is important is that we should be open to the truth, have the desire to find it and that when we get the truth, we have the courage and conviction to live by it, and to fight for it if necessary. Just like St Thomas the Apostle did after he realised the truth about Jesus: "My Lord and my God!"

Good afternoon

Please find attached a wonderful and thought-provoking Sunday Message from Fr Antonio for the second Sunday of Easter.

I was reminded this week that I have been writing the 'Parish Note' for just over a year now. It wasn't intentional to share my inner most random thoughts online from my garden shed, even if it did save my fingers from endless papercuts received from printing and folding 600+ newsletters each week. I had even almost forgotten my special novena asking for a 'paper jam free' Friday afternoon when pleading with the parish office photocopier to comply, just to get everything ready in time. I am certain that in due course our previous normal service will resume once again..

For the past few months, usually in the late afternoon, early evening whilst on my way home, I have come across a gentleman who I encounter roughly at the same point in the road each time, riding a 'Penny Farthing' bicycle. When I first saw him, I was quite surprised, but now he seems to be a normal daily fixture. I don't know who 'PFG' (Penny Farthing Guy) is, where he lives, why he is riding a Penny Farthing or even where he got it from. Being an inquisitive type, I'd like to know and ask him all sorts of questions, but it might just have to remain a mystery (unless someone knows who he is!)

I used to love riding a bicycle in my younger days having the feeling of freedom and adventure. I recall going on all sorts of bike rides with my friends, sometimes daring each other to sit precariously on the handlebars or on the back carrier being scared witless. I also remember getting into trouble for having grease all over my white socks from the chain and for racing around on my father's prized lawn with my sister, as we unintentionally created a shiny figure of eight pattern over the turf.

In my previous career, as a newly appointed and eager recruit, I was given a dilapidated bike to use to travel around an area of North Watford. It was a 'character building steed' which required a certain amount of courage or in fact stupidity, as the brake blocks were rather worn. I discovered this quite by chance as I free wheeled down 'Gallows Hill' at quite a high rate of knots, my eyes streaming with water and cheeks flapping in the wind, unable to stop. The huge sparks that came off the bottom of the metal Blakey's hammered into the soles of my uniformed shoes were quite a sight to behold before I finished up in the hedge!

There is actually a Patron saint for Cyclists, La Madonna del Ghisallo. According to the legend, the Medieval Count Ghisallo was travelling by the hamlet of Magréglio in Italy, when he was attacked by bandits. He saw an image of the Blessed Virgin Mary at a shrine, ran to it and was saved from the robbers. The apparition became known as La Madonna del Ghisallo, and she became a patron of local travellers.

In later times, the hill Madonna del Ghisallo was made part of the Giro di Lombardia bicycle race and has often featured in the Giro d'Italia as well. The Church which sits on top of the steep hill became a natural stopping point for cyclists. For this reason, a local priest, Father Ermelindo Vigano, proposed that La Madonna del Ghisallo be declared the patron saint of cyclists by Pope Pius XII. Nowadays the shrine of Madonna del Ghisallo contains a small cycling museum with photos and artifacts from the sport. There also burns an

eternal flame for cyclists who have died. Its first action was to organize a torch relay from the chapel to the Vatican, delivering the torch to Pope John Paul II...

HRH PRINCE PHILIP RIP - On Friday 9th April, the death of Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh was announced. Following the sad news, Cardinal Vincent offered prayers for the repose of his soul:

'At this moment of sadness and loss I pray for the repose of the soul of Prince Philip, Her Majesty the Queen's faithful and loyal husband. I pray for the Queen and all of the Royal Family. 'How much we will miss Prince Philip's presence and character, so full of life and vigour. He has been an example of steadfast loyalty and duty cheerfully given. May he rest in peace.'

Those who do not apply are at risk of losing their rights to live and work here or access important services such as healthcare. Older and vulnerable people may require assistance with the online application or not even know that their status is at risk. In many cases their main point of contact with society will be through the Church.
