Sunday Message from Fr Peter on the 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time



For me this Sunday's readings have a gardening theme running through them. We hear of God taking a cutting from a great cedar tree and planting it at the top of the mountain. It will, Ezekiel reminds us, become a noble cedar and every kind of bird will live in it – it will be a sign to all that Lord is the One that wills all life. In the Gospel Jesus reminds us that the tiniest seed can be the beginning of an enormous plant!

If the plants in your garden this year are anything like those in the garden of No 3 Windhill, then you will have, like me, had to think hard about the layout of your beds... The combination of the weather etc., has resulted in some usually medium sized plants becoming great thugs!

My silver leafed globe artichoke is already a good 5ft high with its flower buds beginning to rise up through the foliage;

The *cephalaria*, *gargantua* (that's a giant cream coloured scabius and rather fine!) is for the first time truly "gargantua" well up to 5 ft. too.

Our Lady's statue in one of the beds is being smothered by a couple of usually gentle, low plants...in fact much of the garden is going mad!

I did realise last year that my main Dahlia bed was going to need lifting and replanting, since I have left the Dahlias in for at least six years and they have grown very big, suffocating everything else in the summer. So, it was lifting and dividing time earlier this year. It has gone well and I took the opportunity to try and put everything back with the tallest at the back and the lowest at the front.. We'll see soon how well I have managed it.

So, it is not just mustard "trees" that can grow; we too can do the same and possibly amaze ourselves at how much we can grow and also astound ourselves at what tasks we can take on, putting out branches strong enough to hold the weight of others that the Lord might send us to carry for a while. What a delight and what a challenge to occasionally have to reassess ourselves and accept the great spurts of growth that God sends us!

What can I do differently?

Some of you may be coming out of lockdown feeling like a different person; wondering how you can continue to make a difference in the lives of those we meet. You may feel you've been "away" from church for a long time and are keen to re-engage in a more meaningful way as things open up.

If that's the case, I invite you to prayerfully consider making a renewed commitment to taking an active role in our parish community.

Many of you have already been working really hard to serve and care for those in our parish community during lockdown – visiting the sick and elderly, keeping those isolated up to date with parish news, cleaning and sanitising the church, running online course and events and keeping our website up to date, in order to offer some spiritual and practical support to our online community. We are very grateful to you!

However, the work of building community and sharing the Gospel does not stop! As sacramental programmes and other activities gradually restart, it is the calling of each one of us to consider how we can best help serve the community.

Most activities involve a team of Catechists – volunteers from within the parish who journey with those preparing for the sacraments and share and celebrate faith with them. We already have a number of parishioners who are very dedicated to this and we couldn't do what we do without you – thanks! I know they would attest to how rewarding being a Catechist can be! Catechesis comes from the Greek meaning "to echo", because our first calling, as baptised Christians, is to transmit to others the Good News of Jesus Christ that we have received.

And please let me be clear: A catechist is not somebody else; they are not a specially-qualified person in the parish who knows it all. YOU can be a catechist! You might be the one who someone is in need of encountering to make a positive difference in their lives! A Catechist does not need a degree in theology, but simply a willingness and enthusiasm to be a witness to the seed of faith planted in them and a sharer of the Gospel message of Christ's love to others; even in the unworthiness we sometimes feel to be able to do this!

What does this actually mean practically? Well, being a Catechist can involve anything from making cups of tea, to chatting with someone and making them feel welcome, to facilitating a discussion on a topic of faith. We all have such varied talents and gifts and all can be useful in journeying with people and sharing the joy of Gospel message!

We are currently especially in need of parishioners willing to accompany our young people, as they prepare for the Sacrament of Confirmation and also in their journey towards adolescence and through the teenage years generally. But there are many other areas of sacramental preparation where your help is also needed.

(Depending on the further easing of restrictions, we may be able to organise a face-to-face meeting for anyone interested in finding out more about what being a Catechist involves – watch this space!)??

If you feel moved to find out more and get involved (even if you are not sure how!), then please do get in contact with me, Sophie Sullivan, in the first instance and we will be able to talk through the possibilities.

Good afternoon

Please find attached the Sunday Message from Fr Peter on the Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time with some lovely photographs taken in the garden of number 3. This can also be found on our website. Looking at the beautiful blue sky today, although slightly overcast, it is difficult to believe that this time last week following the very heavy downpour of rain, we had a flood in St Joseph's Church. Assisted by Fr Antonio, we bailed out and mopped at least twelve full buckets of water which had found its way in, as we stood soaked to the skin, with very wet, squelchy feet, resembling deck hands armed with super mops, but without singing a hearty sea shanty (as that is not currently permitted under Government guidelines!) Thankfully no permanent damage was caused and looking in the church the following day, you would be none the wiser, not even knowing that Fr Peter had later secretly scaled the roof to inspect and clear the gutter! Water seemed to be a feature of last weekend, as on Sunday afternoon, I noticed that I suddenly had water running down the walls of my utility room and the ceiling was not where it really should be, slumping downwards like a deflated, wrinkly, wet balloon, ready to pop at any moment. Remembering a scene from the 'Poseidon adventure', I prised my blissfully unaware, snoozing, significant other from the depths of the armchair to help me turn off the water and stem the leak from the hot water cylinder in the airing cupboard above. Emptying the space quickly of wet towels and bedding, some of which were new and others I hadn't seen for some years took a few minutes. Finding in pristine condition, a St Joseph's school tea towel which had self-portraits of my children on, carefully stored away approx. 15 years ago, never to be used(!) brought back happy memories and a brief lull of calm in a semi-frantic moment . We still await the fitting of a new hot water cylinder courtesy of British gas whilst we shower in cold water and heat up the kettle for a treat, with the walls emitting a musty, mildewy aroma as they continue to dry out.. but it could really be a lot worse..

SETTLEMENT SCHEME FOR EUROPEAN CITIZENS- EU, EEA and Swiss citizens who were living in the UK by 31st December 2020 have until 30th June 2021 to apply for the Settlement Scheme. Those who do not apply are at risk of losing their rights to live and work here or access important services such as healthcare. There is a need to continue drawing this to people's attention as we approach the deadline. Older and vulnerable people may require assistance with the online application or not even know that their status is at risk. In many cases their main point of contact with society will be through the Church. Please note, Irish citizens do not need to apply.
