Good morning

Please find attached the Sunday Message from Fr Peter on the Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, which can also be found on our web site.

With the 2020 Summer Olympic Games due to start today in Japan, here are a few Olympic fun facts ..

- The first Olympic Games took place in 776BC. The original Olympics began as part of an Ancient Greek
 festival, which celebrated Zeus, the Greek God of sky and weather. The whole competition lasted for up
 to six months, and included games like wrestling, boxing, long jump, javelin, discus and chariot racing.
- In 393 AD, the Olympic Games were cancelled and didn't start up again for over 1,500 years. Emperor
 Theodosius I, a Roman ruler, banned the Greek Olympics due to the religious element of the
 celebration. He considered the Olympics to be a pagan festival, which had no place in his Christian
 country.
- The first Olympiads saw athletes compete in loincloths, a runner called Orsippus changed the face of the games when he appeared naked, appealing to the nation as a symbol of 'Greekness'. Nudity proved a sign of fearlessness, courage and power and was also considered a tribute to the gods. Participants would even lather themselves in olive oil to best show off their physique. Apparently the word 'gymnasium' comes from the Greek word "gymnós" which means naked.
- At the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin, two Japanese pole vaulters Shuhei Nashida and his friend Sueo
 Oe were set for a tie-breaker to decide who took silver and who took bronze. The duo decided to
 decline the tie-break scenario and famously cut the two medals in half. They then fused the bronze
 with the silver to make two new 'friendship medals'.
- The Olympic rings were first produced in 1913, from a design created by the Games' modern founder –
 Baron Pierre de Coubertin. Their five colours (along with the white backdrop) reflect colours found on
 the flags of all participating nations, so everyone is represented. The overlaps also represent
 international cooperation, and the coming together of athletes from all over the world.
- Until 1912, first-place Olympic medals were made of solid gold but it's no longer the case. The heavy first-place medals are now covered in only 6 grams of gold.
- At the Tokyo 2020 Olympics, medals will contain parts of old electronics, in an effort to make the Games more sustainable. Japanese citizens are donating these materials by recycling their old devices...

CHURCH UPDATE

Following the lifting of restrictions, we remain committed to ensuring that our Churches are a safe place to gather to worship.

Do I still have to book a place to attend Mass?

No, there is no longer the requirement to book a place to attend Mass, simply turn up to worship as you used to do at St Joseph's and Holy Cross. We hope to return to our full schedule of Masses at the beginning of September. At the current time Most Holy Redeemer remains closed.

What happens when I arrive at Church?

You will be greeted by one of our volunteer Stewards who will provide assistance, should you require it. We still have a sign in QR code displayed at the entrance, so please feel free to use this. Please sanitise your hands with hand gel which is provided upon entry and decide where you would like to sit.

Where can I sit?

In St Joseph and the English Martyrs, we have maintained socially distanced seating on the **left-hand side of the Church**, with **every other pew available to use**. If you choose to sit on this side of the Church please ensure that you wear a face covering. On the right-hand side of the Church **every pew is available** to be used.

Do I need to wear a mask?

Face coverings are strongly recommended and welcomed in our Churches. If you sit in a socially distanced pew (on the left hand side of St Joseph's) please wear a face mask in consideration of those around you if able to do so.

What will happen at Mass?

We can now celebrate a full length Mass with singing. The physical Sign of Peace remains suspended and Holy Communion is distributed in the hand under one kind by Father Peter and Father Antonio, who will continue to wear a face shield. After receiving the Blessed sacrament, you are able to return to your seat and do not have to leave the Church.

What about Altar Servers, Readers and Eucharistic Ministers?

If you are an Altar Server, Reader or Eucharistic Minister and would like to continue with your service or have decided that you no longer wish to continue, please advise the parish office, so that we can start to prepare a rota, plan any training that is needed, along with any required DBS updates.

Can I use the toilet in the Church?

Regrettably our toilets remain closed at the current time.

Is the Repository open?

Yes, the Repository at St Joseph's is now open for the sale of cards and gifts

Is the Church still being cleaned?

Yes. We have a fantastic team of volunteer cleaners and stewards at our churches, who have done and continue to do an amazing job. After each Mass, all of the pews/ kneelers are wiped down, as are all touch points (door handles, hand gel bottles etc), the floor is swept and mopped. The whole of the Church is then 'fogged'. We leave out anti- bacterial wipes, spray and paper towels at the entrance alongside our hand-gel and ask you to help us by wiping down your own pew if you have entered the Church for private prayer. All donations of anti bacterial wipes and spray are very gratefully received as we do go through a lot! We also continue to need help, so please stay after Mass for a few minutes to assist us if possible as many hands make light work! Thank you.

PLANNING THE RETURN OF READERS, ALTAR SERVERS, EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS - If you have been a Eucharistic Minister (either at Mass or visiting the Sick or Housebound), Reader, Altar server, Musician or Welcomer, and are now willing to continue in your volunteer role, or no longer wish to continue, please do let us know now(if you have not done so already) so that we can start to plan the way forward.
